Curriculum News

I have included two mathematical challenges which you might like to have a go at with your child/children.

This week's Mathematical challenges:

Reception to Year 3

How many things can you find that are longer than 3 of your foot lengths but shorter than 5 of your foot lengths?

What is there in your home that is 6 of your foot lengths long?

Years 4-6

What might the perimeter of a garden fence be if the area of the garden is 20 square metres? You have 90 metres of fence for a garden. What might your garden look like? Happy inquiry.

Reading is another core learning area here at St Joseph's School. Children develop their reading skills, knowledge and understanding by reading regularly. At St Joseph's School regular reading at home forms a major part of homework set each evening. Why not create regular timeslots throughout the week whereby all electronic devices in the home are turned off and members of the family spend 15 minutes reading together. Happy reading.

Fees to reduce across all Catholic Diocesan Primary Schools

The South Australian Commission for Catholic Schools has announced that it will make Catholic education more affordable by lowering the school fees of every Catholic diocesan primary school in 2021 under its Making Catholic Education More Affordable initiative.

The exact level of fee reduction in each diocesan primary school will vary from school to school to take into account their circumstances and the needs of their families.

Our school has been working with Catholic Education South Australia to finalise our fees for 2021 which are outlined below.

2021-2023 Three Year Strategic Plan

On Friday September 11 as part of our Pupil Free Day staff were involved in developing our 2021-2023 Three Year Strategic Plan. The day involved staff reflecting on what has been achieved strategically in the past three years, our vision for the next three years and bringing this together in order to develop our three year strategic plan. During Term 4 our 2021-2023 Three Year Strategic Plan will be presented to the school board for approval in preparation for the 2021 school year.

Making Space for Learning 2 Year Inquiry Project

As mentioned in earlier newsletters this year, our school is currently participating in the 2020-21 Making Space for Learning Inquiry Project. The aim of the inquiry is to be able to identify the behavioural and learning difficulties associated with developmental trauma and formulate an informed and effective educational response. To this end, the inquiry begins with a detailed understanding of early year's brain development. It then examines the nature and effects of developmental trauma. Lastly, it provides strategies to respond to the specific behavioural and learning difficulties associated with developmental trauma.

Teaching staff have recently completed collecting quantitative data (number/frequency) relating to our whole school inquiry question; Does the use of core practice (calming strategies) at the beginning of learning blocks support and improve student self-regulation? The quantitative data collected focused on; How students re-entered their space for learning after a break (recess, lunch, specialist lesson).

Teaching staff have also been collecting Qualitive Data (Anecdotal notes etc) prior to implementing strategies such as meditation, mandalas, drawing, quiet music, journal writing, reading over a 10 week timeframe to support children re-enter their learning space ready to fully engaging in the learning opportunities presented to them.

As a result of the restrictions surrounding the Covid 19 pandemic, the 2020 Catholic Schools Music Festival Choir will be in the form of a video link up recorded this week. Copies of the video will be available for purchase in Term 4. Natalie Doyle has once again been coordinating our involvement in 2020. Natalie has been working with the choir regularly this year in preparation for the video event. The Catholic Schools Music Festival Choir is held during the last week of Term 3 each year. It is a wonderful advertisement for Catholic Education in South Australia. A big thank you to Natalie Doyle for all her efforts in preparing our children for this year's event.

How do anxiety conditions develop?

Feeling anxious is a survival response to situations where there are dangers or threats: it helps us to respond efficiently. However, some people react more quickly or more intensely to such situations.

Primary school years

As children's thinking skills expand and become more abstract, they can develop fears of imaginary creatures and monsters. They may also worry about schoolwork, tests and their social relationships. As they grow older, they may have anxiety about family relationships or global issues such as war or famine.

The following behaviours might indicate a primary school-age child is experiencing higher levels of anxiety than average:

- Wanting things to be perfect.
- Reluctance to ask for help.
- Asking for reassurance excessively.
- Difficulty joining in.
- Requests to go to sick bay.

Challenging behaviour.

Adolescence

During adolescence, common sources of anxiety include starting secondary school, fitting in with peers, exam stress, body image and family relationships. Worrying about these things isn't necessarily a sign of a mental health condition. But individuals may need additional support if they experience the following:

- Appearing withdrawn and reluctant to participate in classroom activities or social situations.
- Oversensitivity to criticism or feedback.
- Perfectionist and fear of failure.
- Missing classes or excusing themselves to go to the toilet on a regular basis.
- Negative thinking and always expecting the worst.

Challenging behaviour.

Looking beyond behaviour to try to identify what might be underneath can help you respond with understanding. Anxiety can be difficult to spot because it presents in many ways. The important point is to notice that there's a concern and seek further advice and assistance.

Students and families are reminded to be wary of approaches from strangers, especially when they are unaccompanied or travelling to and from school. The perfect break before the later end of the day commences. This is your time where you can do what you want.


From 2 to 3pm, usually held in the hall, all are most welcome.

- 6. have opportunities for social interaction


New LEGO wall and LEGO table!
